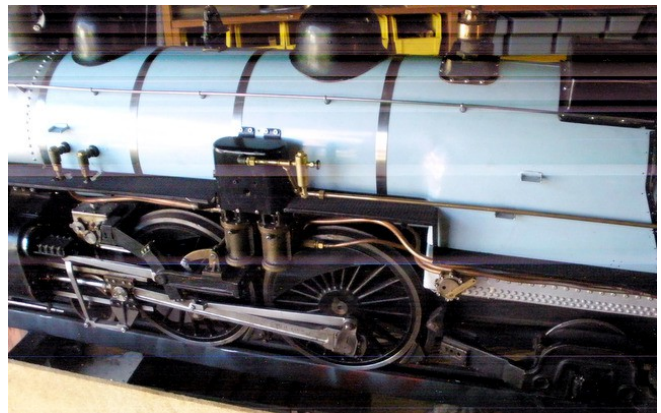
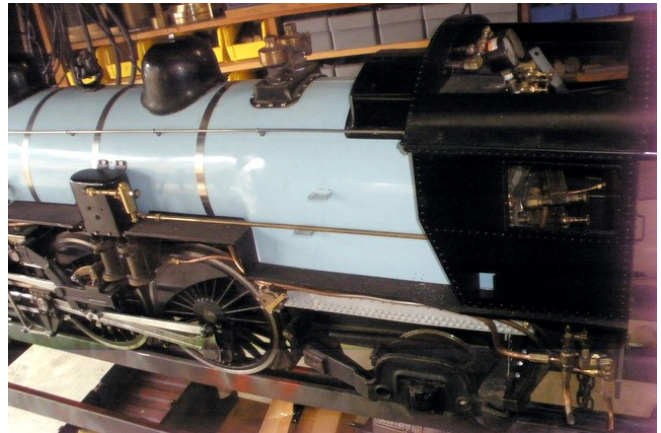
They will all be available to members to take what they want at the next meeting. They are generally in excellent condition and of high quality. Make sure not to miss this opportunity to add to your library.

How I Survived the Pandemic of 2020...
The History of "Seams To Help" Organization

When the virus that would become known as COVID-19 hit our country I realized that we were into this for the long haul and our only protection at the time would be layered masks & gloves but both became impossible to purchase very quickly. Although I had a decent supply on hand already, I knew that it wouldn't last very long, so I designed my own mask patterns and ran some at-home testing with Bob as my assistant. Using my powerful hair blower on high & a candle flame, I determined that it took three layers of quilt-quality cotton, with the seams oriented in opposite directions (to avoid any openings), such that it would NOT only block the flame from being blown out, the flame didn't even waver. Anything less and the mask failed.

In early March, we began wearing our masks. By mid-March, I realized that masks were virtually impossible to purchase even by even medical personnel. These unsung professionals are at the front lines of this major pandemic, despite assurances from those who claimed that this was only a hoax and nothing more than a common cold. Since I knew better, I quickly began assembling local volunteers via NextDoor (an online group of local residents) to make more of my masks with donated fabric for hospitals & healthcare facilities all over the Bay Area. We accomplished this using the old-fashion, cottage industry, assembly line method of constructing masks in stages, transporting them to each other's homes with porch drop off, in what we called "Ding Dong Door Dash", with no in-person contact.

We wore masks & gloves during our volunteering hours and not one of us contracted COVID-19 because we were all being very careful.



We call ourselves "Seams To Help" and we have made & donated close to 12,000 three-layer masks. We have now branched out to include more Compassion Projects products and have become a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization. This allows us to accept monetary donations so that we volunteers can provide even more needed items for our community & beyond.



Currently, our Compassion Projects products include Angel Baby Gowns for babies who passed on, Patriotic Pillow cases for our deployed troops, and Fidget Mazes for students who are having difficulty assimilating back into the classroom following the pandemic. There are more projects that are in the planning stages and even our fabric scraps even are used to make Scrappy Pet Beds for puppies & kitties that are waiting for adoptions from animal shelters.



The "Seams To Help" organization kept me & the other volunteers active and gave us a purpose during this very difficult & trying times of the Pandemic. We will continue to do good works with the help of those who are able.

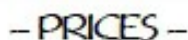
