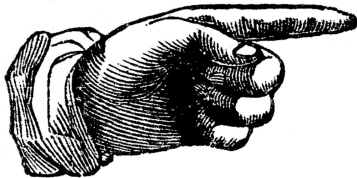

Minutes of the Board Meeting

Officers present: Jon Sargent, Matt Petach, Rich Croll, Rick Reaves, Jerry Kimberlin, John Lisherness, Lisa Kimberlin, incoming officers Steve Fares & Sarah Buhre with Sammy Tamez being absent. President Jon Sargent called the meeting to order at 1108 hours Pacific time.

Old Business:

Last Month's Minutes Acceptance: Jon Sargent presented the minutes from the November 10th 2024 Board meeting and the copy he had with him was the not the updated version. An updated version was put forth for approval where Rick Reaves made a motion that the Board accept the updated minutes. Matt seconded the motion and since there was no discussion, no abstentions and no objections, the motion passed unanimously.

Mudslide: There was a new mudslide after the last meeting. We will be putting broken concrete above the rebuilt retaining wall to provide more support and Rich Croll brought a 25-foot roll of rice straw wattle which will be placed halfway up to keep mud from washing down.

A brief reminder that 2026 is our 90th anniversary so let's plan to do something nice for it.

Clubhouse Meeting Room Remodel: We will be starting on an effort to revamp the meeting room. First step will be taking down the existing photos and scanning them in to preserve digital versions of them. We have a member who is a cabinet maker, possibly Justin Annuevo that we will reach out to about suggestions for display cabinets.

Green Bin for the Club: Could we get our own green bin for work days, so we can clear out more dead leaves and branches without having to drive them all down to the golf course?

Landscape Topics: We have an oak tree above the tunnel area that needs to be cut back, but how to do it safely is the concern.

There is a fugitive pine tree on the Heinz loop the park would like us to remove. They are very happy for us to remove any bay trees and Monterey pines that show up. Likewise, scotch broom should be pulled up if we see it.

We tentatively talk about having a work day in March to do landscape cleanup. Park recommends SpecraFlow as weed killer, mixed with a surfactant like dish soap. We heard recommendations for ExperTree and ArborWorks for tree removals.

Clubhouse Stove Chimney Pipe: We need to clean our chimney pipe out next summer when we're not using the stove.

Club Library Asset Catalog: We discussed creating an electronic catalog of what books and magazines the club owns.

Club facility Usage Fee: We discussed opening up rental of the facility for birthday parties, but ultimately decided to stay with the current rule of needing a sponsoring member to schedule the use of the facility, with a suggested donation rate of \$2 per adult, \$1 per child.

We adjourn the meeting at 1143 hours Pacific time.

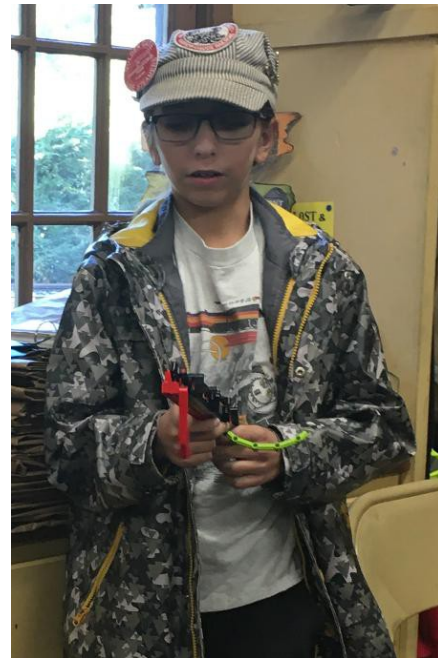
Bits and Pieces

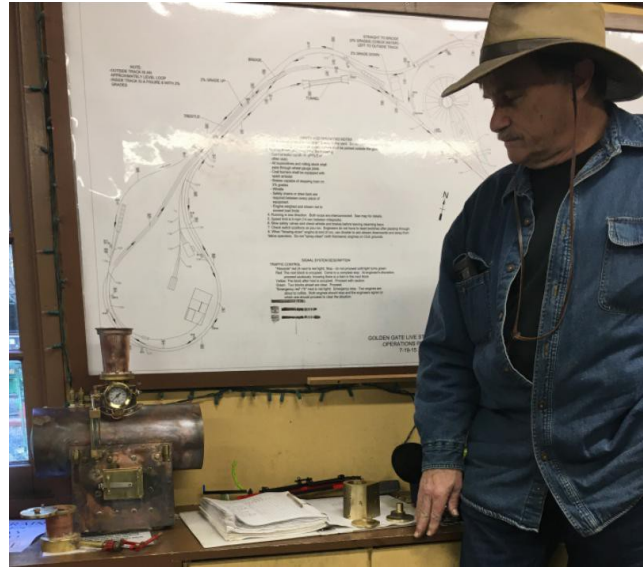
Charlie Buhre is building a 7½" gauge Marie Estelle to the design by the late Don Young and brought in his latest work to share with the group. Charlie enjoys lathe work and decided to have a go at the cylinder covers, which came out quite nicely. I expect we will see a lot more from this young man as his skills and confidence increase. He's already making a great start!



Rahim Pereira continues to expand his engineering knowledge using Lego and constructed a working fishing rod & reel. Upon closer examination it is clear Rahim is figuring out how mechanisms work and how to create his own version.



He also made a nice “GGLS” placard, which he kindly donated to the club.



Charlie Reiter has been busy in his shop recently and brought in two interesting pieces. The first was a Suffolk boiler, which Charlie explained is a simplified Yorkshire boiler. I, for one, was glad he made that point clear as I didn't consider it a simplified version of anything! Charlie described the order of operation and assembly but did state that he had it together & apart many times before completion & final testing.



Rich Croll saw a need to drill the rail ends quickly and accurately for connector plates. After a little planning he produced a simple but effective drill jig made from . . . what else, something from his scrap bin, the source of material for all model engineers.

The design Rich settled on is easy to set up & use. It reduces the frustration level for a tedious job that requires fairly high accuracy and repeatability.

Nice job Rich. Now explain to me why your scrap bin is so well stocked!



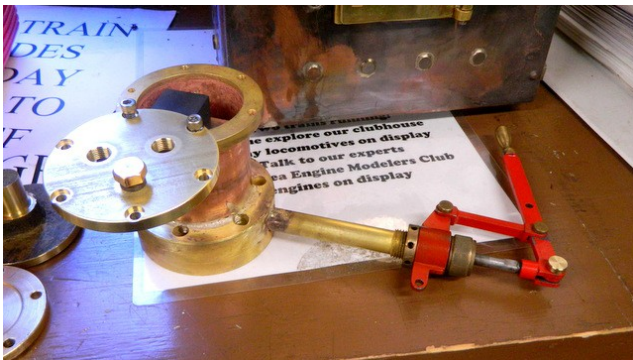
The boiler ends were shown during the October meeting and are secured with 20 studs & nuts and sealed with an O-ring. In full-size they were mounted between the front wheels of a Steam Waggon (British spelling), and several are preserved in running condition in the UK.

Are we going to see a Steam Waggon in the future, Charlie? Or will this be like the steam fire engine you're not building!

Video Recommendation



The second item from Charlie was a regulator for the 7½" gauge Climax he is (completely) rebuilding.



The valve is Charlie's own design and incorporates a sliding plate made from carbon on a phosphor bronze body. The original design by Kozo is a needle in a tapered hole, which works well in ¾" scale, but in 1½", Charlie believes it's a little inadequate (I agree). In his usual easy-going style Charlie made the design and construction seem easy, but I'm sure it wasn't! I look forward to the day this locomotive is finished & ready for testing on the track.

1/4" scale Case Steam Tractor Engine



This is a model of a 1/4" scale Case steam traction engine. The tractor was professionally built by Turning Mfg. in 1993, has a steel welded boiler and is coal fired.

The length is 5'4", width is 29" wide at the rear wheel axle, and the rear wheels are 19 1/2" in diameter.

The total weight is close to 500 pounds without water in the boiler & feed tank.

The safety valve pressure is set to lift at 150 PSI and there is a ASME standard soft plug in the crown sheet.

The boiler feed pump is driven from the engine and the governor works to control load speed. Also included is a full set of drawings.



Included are two injectors (where one of them is a super scale type) and extra front wheels.

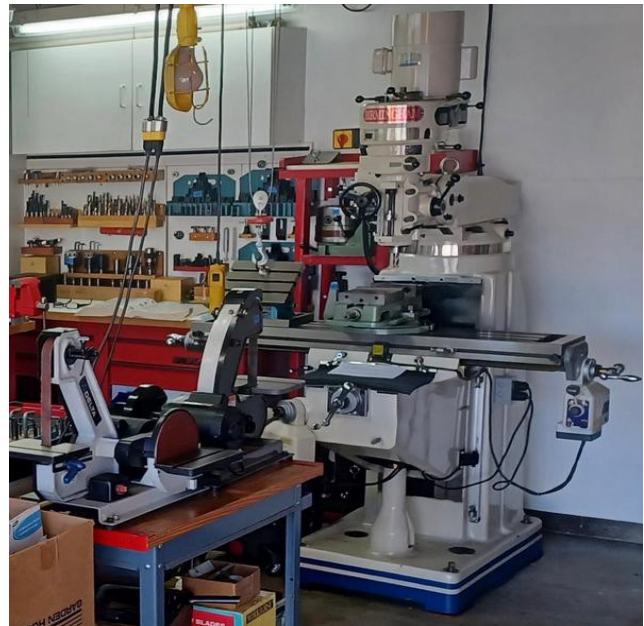

Some of John's items include:



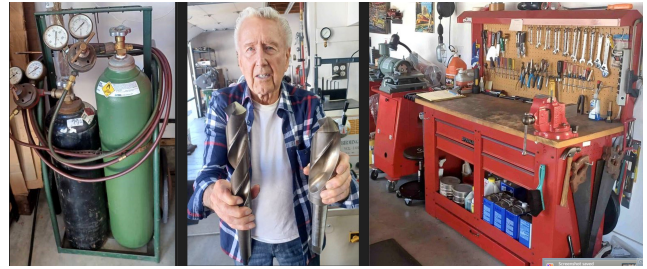
