#### **Officer Reports**

**Secretary:** Cleaned up the membership roster list of past members and who aren't currently paid up on their membership.

**Treasurer:** Club is doing well and donations are coming in. We spent a lot of money this week on the materials for the new High Track swing bridges, wheels for the Public Train riding cars and club insurance. Another insurance payment is due soon.

**Safety:** Nothing to report.

**Director at Large:** Nothing to report.

**Ombudsperson:** For next year we have had a couple of nominees for the vacant Vice President position and one of them is Lew Breon. If you have more nominations, please contact Lisa. The current Board members have volunteered to run for their current position.

#### **Committee Reports**

**Buildings:** Nothing to report.

**Grounds:** Andy Weber is out of town but Bruce mentioned that Andy made multiple trips and taking the club's compostable waste to the East Bay Regional Park District's green waste bin.

**Ground Track:** Jim McKibbin reported that the spur track to Bulger barn is completed & leveled out. They also completed the re-profiling of the inside track area by the ducks before the bridge.

We have been acquiring new supplies for the track system such as ballast & track screws. The metal items are stainless steel due to corrosion issues.

**Signals:** John Davis says there has been a problem with a potential false signal by the ducks but we are not sure if it's fixed. So if you see a red, it could be a false red; treat it as a regular red & slow down until you see the green at the next block.

**High Track:** Brian Perry says we have had a great crew helping to make the new G-scale track possible and they have laid over 600 feet already!

Track laying members Brian Parry, Lew Breon, Charlie Buhre, Lisa Kimberlin, Sammy Tamez & Rahim Pereira have been helping.

They are hoping to make it to the High Track lift bridges out by the roundhouse in the next day or two. Future issues include adapting the lift bridges and fixing the track unevenness. **Locomotives:** Paul Hirsh says everything is working fine and the RGS #20 & #22 are ready for the Fall Open House next weekend.

He is still testing the injector on the Heinz locomotive. He ran it a couple of weeks ago for about 45 minutes and it was fine. The axle pump is there to keep the boiler filled if there is a problem with the injector.

He took the 4760 diesel's motor apart again and made sure the brushes weren't stuck since it seems to be losing power somewhere. We will test it with the Public Train today to see if it makes it up the Heinz loop. If it doesn't, will have to use 8150 for backup.

John Davis bought a crane scale to measure tractive force for testing of the engines.

**Shop and Rolling Stock:** Rich Croll is absent but Paul Hirsh says that because many riding cars had worn wheels, Rich purchased some from Accucraft & replaced them. He also had to replace the brakes on two riding cars.

**Public Train:** Walter is back from his hip surgery and feels no pain! Surgery went well, but expects a slow recovery.

Fridge is stocked for next week and grandson will be weed spraying around the track.

**Landscape:** Jo Ann Miller is absent watching the 49er's play, but sent a report to Bruce.

The woodshed is full & weeds have been pulled. If you see weeds in the steaming bay, please pull a few for us and big bags for waste can be found under the woodshed.

Thanks to Bob Walker for all the work cleaning up the areas around the track as well as new member Phil Jenschke who has helped out a lot.

Roundhouse and Storage: Jon Sargent says it is time to pay the yearly storage fees for those who rent space to store their equipment at the club facility. Payment is due by Dec 31st and there is no grace period. Lisa will take payments by cash, check, credit card or Apple Pay and if you pay electronically, it must be done in person. If you have rental space to vacate, please let Jon know as soon as possible so the next member on the waiting list can apply for it.


Keep up the good work Ben and handle each problem as they present themselves, and in the not-too-distant future you will be out on the ground track enjoying the rewards of your efforts!



Bruce Anderson recently completed a stationary boiler started by his late friend Roy Mott. Bruce acquired it from Roy many years ago and over the last year or two has worked to take the unfinished boiler to the beautiful, finished item shown in the photograph.

It is coal fired and is finished in brass & purple heart lagging and works very well (after a hydro test of course). Bruce has three stationary engines he intends to run from this boiler, and a generator to power a Christmas ornament. Bruce also brought along a set of thread identifiers which he obtained from Micro Fasteners and an ingenious clamping tool made by Bruce to hold small pipe while threading the ends.

I really liked the stationary boiler, and the smell of coal smoke always takes me back to childhood.



Rahim Pereira continues to learn about mechanical mechanisms and created a "Candy Dispenser" utilizing

Lego (Rahim's current favorite medium). The dispenser would automatically reload "Candy" (actually, a Lego brick for demonstration) and was very pleasing to watch in action.
